

Kings County Kings Head to **National Midget Championships**

The Kings County Kings Midget Female team rewrote hockey history on PEI. The Kings recently captured the first Midget Female Atlantic Hockey Championship for PEI and will now represent the Atlantic region at the Esso Cup, National Female Midget Championships in St. Albert, Alberta.



Kings County Kings Midget Female Atlantic Champions

The Kings County Kings defeated the New Brunswick representative 3-1 to capture the championship. The Kings jumped out to an early start with their first goal 2:18 into the first period. Ellen Jenkins scored the first goal to begin the charge, with an assist from Kiaya Jorden.

Again early in the second period, the Kings would jump on a couple of great opportunities to take control of the game. Alyssa Ferguson scored 2:02 into the period (assisted by Sophie Jenkins) and Anna McInnis would pounce again a short time later at 3:35 (assists by Laura Bradley and Sophie Jenkins) to take control of the game.

Kings County carried all the momentum through two periods with a commanding three goal lead. The Northern Stars of New Brunswick came out strong in the third period applying constant pressure and carrying a majority of the play in the third. The Northern Stars would finally close the gap and break the goose egg at 7:45 potting their first gold to make the score 3-1.

The host team played strong defensively down the stretch while both teams had great chances to score. While there were many chances at both ends of the rink, the Kings County Kings and the very supportive home crowd counted down the final seconds and the Kings County Kings were crowned the 2011 Atlantic Midget Female Champions. Emma Meanor recorded the win in nets for the Kings.

The Kings will now represent the Atlantic region at the 2011 Esso Nationals Midget Female Hockey Championships. The Championships in St. Albert, Alberta runs from April 17-23.

The Mid Isle Matrix Midget AAA team capped off a great regular season with a provincial title over the three time defending champions, the Charlottetown Abbies.


Capturing the provincial title would lead them to the Minor Midget Atlantics in Clarenville Newfoundland. After an opening day tie to NB and a second day loss to Newfoundland, the team found themselves behind the eight ball in the Championships.

The Matrix rallied on with two big win's to end the round robin potion of play with wins over the host Tri Pen and a close 4-3 win over Nova Scotia. With a 2-1-1 record, the Matrix would advance to the Championship game through a very close tie breaking procedure.

The Matrix would extract revenge against Newfoundland with a 4-1 victory to claim the 2011 Atlantic Minor Midget Championship. This would extend the streak for PEI, claiming the Minor Midget Atlantic Championship three years in a row.

The Summerside Western Capitals claimed their second Maritime Hockey League championship in three years. The team also captured the Kent Cup in 2009. The Capitals secured the title with a dramatic come-from-behind road victory to sweep the Pictou County Weeks Crushers in the best-of-seven MHL series.

With the victory the Capitals now head to the Fred Page Cup in Terrebonne, Quebec, from April 20 to 24. The Eastern Canadian junior A hockey championship tournament will also feature the host Terrebonne Cobras along with the winners of the Central Junior A Hockey League and Quebec Junior AAA Hockey League. The winner of the Fred Page Cup will head to the RBC Cup National Junior A Championships in Camrose, Alberta.

The Capitals' road to the Kent Cup was certainly not easy. After winning just four of their first nine regular-season games, the Caps finished 36-12-1-3 which was good enough for 76 points and second overall in the league.

The Caps swept Miramichi in the Roger Meek Division semifinal, and pulled out a seven-game division final series against Woodstock, which included rallying from a two-goal deficit with 1:11 remaining in the third period of Game 7 to win in overtime.


The Montague Maniacs will play host to the championship April 26 -May 1 at the Montague Wellness Center. Other participating teams include:

THE DON JOHNSON CUP STORY

The year was 1930, the location was Halifax, Nova Scotia where Don Johnson was born. There was no minor hockey at the time, Johnson did play school hockey in his early days. He went on to St. Mary's High School and College where he continued to compete at both levels. Later, he coached both teams with the latter playing at the AUAA level. Johnson also played junior hockey at St. Mary's in Halifax. The next two seasons Johnson played with the Annapolis Valley's Middleton Maple Leafs, then he moved on to play with the Digby Ravens. Returning to Halifax in the

of the Halifax Suburban Hockey League. In addition, during this period Don also played a season with the Bridgewater Hawks, and the Windsor Maple Leafs.

In the late 50's Johnson moved to Campbellton, New Brunswick where he helped the Tigers claim a provincial title during his second year with the team.

As an employee of the Bank of Nova Scotia, Johnson was transferred to St. John's, Newfoundland in December of 1959. He played senior hockey at the local level for two years. During this time his St. Pat's team won the historic Boyle Trophy both seasons (only the Stanley Cup is older than the Boyle Trophy). Johnson was an assistant coach with the St. John's Capitals when they won three consecutive provincial titles to claim the Herder Memorial Trophy.

After his playing and coaching days were over, Johnson was elected president of the St. John's Junior and Senior Hockey League and in the mid 60's was elected president of the Newfoundland Amateur Hockey Association where he would helped lead that province into union with the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association. In the 70's he was the first elected an officer of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association (CAHA), and later was elected president of the national body, a position he held for two years.

During Johnson's term in office, the CAHA returned to international hockey and the Canada Cup, and helmets were made mandatory. He was an officer of the association for ten years and was elected an Honorary Life Member in 1982.

The first Don Johnson Cup was played in 1982 in Kensington P.E.I. Johnson had the privilege of presenting the trophy to his own son, who was the assistant captain for the winning Brother Rice Junior Celtics from St. John's Newfoundland. Robert Cousins was the organizer of the inaugural tournament and led the initiative to have the trophy named in honour of Don Johnson.

DID YOU KNOW?

The World Hockey Association was a rival hockey league from 1973 to 1979. Hockey legends Gordie Howe, Bobby Hull, and Wayne Gretzky played in the league, but it couldn't compete with the NHL. Four current NHL teams came from the WHA. The Edmonton Oilers, Hartford Whalers (now Carolina Hurricanes), Quebec Nordiques (now Colorado Avalanche), and Winnipeg Jets (now Phoenix Coyotes).

In 1930, Toronto Maple Leafs' general manager Conn Smythe placed a winning bet on a longshot horse to pay the cash-strapped Ottawa Senators for star player Frank "King" Clancy.

On March 31, 1923 Frank "King" Clancy played every position for his team. In those days players had to fill in for whatever gap was left when a player needed a rest or was injured and Clancy ended up playing both sides of defense and every forward position. He even played goalie since when a goalie got penalized back then it was their job to serve the penalty. So Clancy played 2 minutes of goal and never let one in.

Development Corner

Off-Ice Tip: The Importance of Off-ice Training

Although great technique is essential to becoming a great skater, you will not be able to reach your full potential if your leg muscles lack in power, flexibility and endurance. That is why an off-ice training program is essential if you are looking to take your skating skills / overall hockey abilities to the next level.

When deciding to engage into an off-ice training program, many do not know where to begin. Are you looking to build more endurance, increase your flexibility or get stronger more powerful muscles? Are you looking to combine them all? In order to help you achieve maximum speed and explosiveness on the ice, you should engage in an off-ice program that focuses on increasing all aspects: power, flexibility and endurance.

Officials Tip: The role of an Official

The basic Role of the official can be broken down into two simple words -"safe" and "fair". By viewing and officiating the game with these two words in mind, an official should be able to call a game that is acceptable to all of the participants.

There is no excuse for an official not to penalize any infraction that threatens the safety of another participant and Hockey Canada calls upon all officials to strictly enforce these types of infractions.

The word "fair" does allow some flexibility in determining which infractions will and will not be penalized. Any infraction that takes away a good scoring chance should be penalized. However, some infractions, although obvious infractions by the wording in the rulebook, can be overlooked if no advantage is gained. Remember that it is the "spirit" or "intent" of the rule that determines an infraction, not the literal wording. This will be interpreted differently in each game, depending on the official, the level of play and the style of play. As officials develop their officiating skills, their "feel for the game" and "judgement" will help them determine the officiating style needed in each game.

Infractions after the whistle should also be penalized accordingly, with emphasis placed on penalizing the instigator of such activity.
